Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) Screening—vaginal swab

From the 12 September 2023 the main test for cervical cancer will be the HPV vaginal swab. 95% of cervical cancers are caused by this virus. You can choose to do this test yourself or ask a clinician to do this. You can still have a clinician do your cervical smear test with a speculum if this is your preference.

Free HPV screening for cervical cancer will be available for women and people with a cervix who are unscreened (have never had a screening test), under screened (haven't had a test in the past 5 years), at higher risk requiring surveillance/follow up, Māori, Pacific, and anyone who is a community service card holder.

Our nurses are available to discuss the options with you.

Sore Throats

Having a sore throat is very common. Sometimes a sore throat is caused by Streptococcus bacteria (strep throat). In children especially a strep throat can lead to rheumatic fever if it is not treated quickly with antibiotics. Rheumatic fever is a serious illness because it can cause heart damage.

We encourage you to bring your child to see the doctor or nurse when they complain of a sore throat so a swab can be taken to rule out strep throat

Every day, nine women in New Zealand are diagnosed with breast cancer, so it's likely that someone in your family, church, community or workplace will be diagnosed with cancer, has had breast cancer in the past, or is supporting someone with breast cancer.

Love yourself this October and get a mammogram. Love your mother, wife, daughters by encouraging them to get a mammogram. Mammograms are free for 45—69 years and are done every 2 years .
